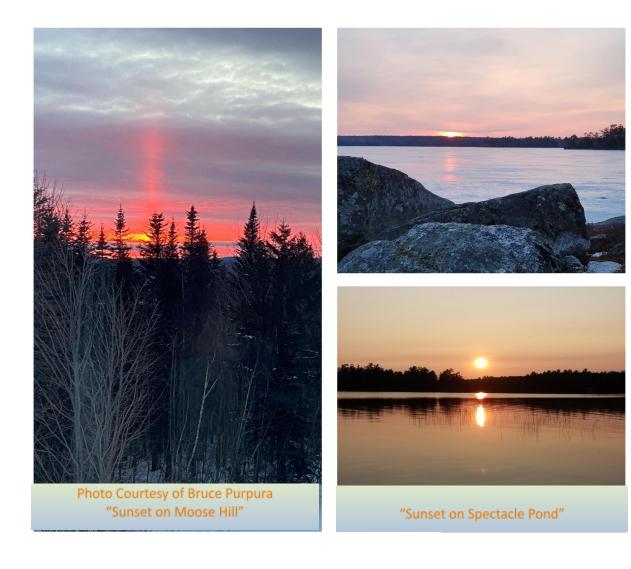

Dog Licensing

Maine State Statute requires all canines be registered when they reach six months of age. Dog licenses expire on December 31, 2022. Dog licenses are available at the Town Office beginning in mid-October. A mandated penalty will be assessed if your dog is licensed after January 31st. Proof of rabies vaccination is required to register all dogs. Online - https://www1.maine.gov/cgi-bin/online/dog_license/index.pl

Assessing & Property Tax Information

Osborn contracts with an out of town tax assessor, to set the value of all property as of April 1st of each year. **If you believe you qualify for a Homestead, Veterans or other exemption, you must file the application by April 1st. The application can be obtained at the town office. If you have removed a structure on your property, contact the town office, as this will be forwarded to the Tax Assessor.** Taxes are generally calculated by late summer and due on October 15th and March 15th, in two installments (subject to change, as approved by Town Meeting).

If you purchase property after April 1st and before July 1st, a copy of the Tax Bill will be mailed to you, as the new owner, but in the name of the old owner. Information about property is contained on assessment tax cards, at the town office.

Hunting & Fishing Licensing

Osborn is an agent for the Maine Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife for hunting and fishing licenses. These licenses are sold through the MOSES system, at the town office. Proof of prior hunting license or hunter safety course completion is required, prior to purchasing a license.

Boats, ATVs and Snowmobiles

Registrations for all recreational vehicles are performed at the Osborn Town Office, through the MOSES system. Boat registrations expire December 31st. Snowmobile and ATV registrations expire June 30th. New registrations require a bill of sale and sales tax is collected at the time of registration, unless the vehicle was purchased from a Maine dealer. General Assistance

Osborn administers a General Assistance program, as required by state law. Applications are available at the Town Office. The Select board, follow the towns ordinance to determine eligibility for assistance.

Police, Fire and Ambulance

Any call for an emergency should go to **9-1-1**. The call is answered by the Hancock County Regional Communications Center in Ellsworth and forwarded to the appropriate agency. Law Enforcement services are provided by the Hancock County Sheriff's Department and the Maine State Police on a call sharing system. Osborn contracts with Capital Ambulance for transport services and the Town maintains its own Municipal Volunteer Fire Department, for fire suppression and rescue coverage. All outdoor burning requires a permit, which can be obtained by the Towns Fire Warden/Fire chief or deputy fire Warden.

Permits & Ordinances

Even though, Osborn is a small community in population, the necessity for some permits and ordinances are still required, some statutorily mandated and other recommended to provide direction and uniformity. Osborn is not required to have a planning board, therefore contracts with LUPC (Land Use Planning Commission) for

all building permits and zoning. Prior to any construction or development, a permit must be obtained.

A copy of the permit application can be found Online - maine.gov/dacf/lupc. or a copy is available at the town office.

Failure to obtain permits or violations of various ordinances, carry substantial penalties. Additionally, when applying for a building permit for new residential constructions, contact must be made with the town office, at that time, to secure the proper address through the E-911 Addressing Officer.

Some positions may not be glamorous or in the spotlight, but the expectations of a few individuals wearing all the hats, may not be statutorily possible or possible due to the demand on time. Wind Environmental Fund - Report

Town of Osborn Energy, Environmental and Property Tax Relief Fund Updated Dated 9/17/2019 -Appendix A

The Town of Osborn received it's first distribution of wind funds for this fund on May 21, 2021 for \$850,000 and the second distribution on February 28, 2022 for \$100,000 for a total amount of \$950,000. The funds were set up in an account at Camden National Bank called the Wind Environmental Fund.

- * Applications were distributed by mail to all eligible tax-paying property owners (per the Appendix approved and Amended by the voters of the Town of Osborn).
- * 128 Applications from Eligible Tax-paying property owners in the Town of Osborn were received, with which 128 checks were processed in the amount of \$858,250.00 and mailed the week of April 12, 2022.
 - + \$850,000.00 (Initial Deposit of Funds per agreement)
 - + \$100,000.00 (Final Deposit of Funds per agreement)
 - + \$263.37 (interest through 5/31/22)
 - \$858,250.00 (128 Applicant Disbursements)
 - \$1,024.00 (128 @ 8.00 Fee Camden National Processing)

During this process from start to finish, the general consensus of participants was that of an appreciation for the opportunity to participate in this value added benefit that would enhance their property in many ways for years to come.

Municipal Fire Department Letter

Hello and Happy Summer to everyone **from your Fire and Rescue Department**. We have gained one new member recently. Zach McAdams has joined us and is working on getting training done and helping us out around the station and answering calls with us. In other news, we have had to replace our pumper, due to a leaking tank and the high cost of replacing it. We obtained another pumper as a gift from the town of Spencer, MA. It also is an older truck, that has been lightly used for a number of years. It does need some work before we can put it on the road. This will be done as soon as McDevitts can make the time to work on it. Once this is completed it should serve us well.

As usual we would like to invite anyone who has an interest to come and talk to us about joining. We need more help so that if we want to go away for a few days that there will be coverage in town for fire, EMS and accident calls without having to wait for Aurora (who also doesn't have enough help.

Just a reminder as we head into summer. Summer is a season of higher risk for wildland and grassland fires. By Maine state law burn permits are required to do any open burning. They are available from the fire warden, Kenny Silsby as well as from the fire department. Also, and this is new, they are available for free online from the Maine Forest Service. Search for Maine Open Burn Permit. You must print it out, read it and sign it agreeing to all the stipulations on it. You may only burn on a class 1 or 2 day. It is your responsibility to check the class day on the day of burn because it may have changed. Also, the fire department may cancel the permit if it is deemed unsafe in our town for any reason. Reasons may include the weather is too dry or too windy or lack of fire coverage among other things. Remember that if you don't have a permit, you can be fined up to \$1000 if your fire gets away from you. Also, if other fire departments come to help put it out you may be liable for restitution costs to any departments involved. So, get your permit and be very careful.

Please remember that fireworks may only be used on your own property or with the owner's permission on someone else's property. Be careful, follow manufacturer's instructions, and make sure you have plenty of water available to put out any fire that ensues. A fire extinguisher should also be available.

From the rescue side of the department if you need assistance because of illness or injury call 911. They will notify us and also get an ambulance on route. When you call be prepared to answer their questions as to location, name, what is going on etc. This way we, as well as the ambulance personnel, have an idea what to be prepared for. Be aware that if you have symptoms that could be COVID but are not life-threatening we may not enter your home. We may wait in your driveway until the ambulance arrives to provide a higher level of care. If a more serious problem develops while waiting, we will come in and do what we can. This reduces the number of people exposed to COVID and lowers the risk of further spread.

Be careful, stay hydrated, don't get overheated and drink plenty of water. Have a great summer. Bret, Paul, Millie and Zach.

Report on the Financial Statements

The other supplementary information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements.

The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplementary information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Dear Friends and Neighbors,

I am honored that you have once again entrusted me with the responsibility of being your State Representative. I continue to serve as the Lead Republican on the Joint Committee for Marine Resources where our economics and resources are in constantly being tested.

Dear Friends, January 1, 2022

On the heels of 2020's challenges, 2021 brought us both amazing progress and frustrating setbacks. The incredible rollout of several effective, FDA approved COVID-19 vaccines helped reduce the risks of this deadly pandemic – but vaccine hesitancy, combined with the dangers of new variants, have prolonged this crisis and created new risks for Maine people. The challenges raised tension levels to boiling points during the fallout of the 2020 presidential election and the January 6th Capitol attack. But despite that, Congress was able to deliver for a nation gripped by an unprecedented pandemic. As we reflect back on the year, we see the important action that will make a difference for Maine people – as well as work still unfinished.

As COVID-19 continued to impact communities across our state and the country, Congress's first priority this year was to confront the pandemic's health threats and economic toll. We immediately got to work on the *American Rescue Plan*, crafting an emergency bill to meet the moment and get our nation back on stable footing. The legislation delivered essential support to businesses facing crises, households in need, and the medical professionals on the front lines of this fight. The funds helped get vaccine shots in arms, while also confronting the damage done to our economy. All told, the *American Rescue Plan* is bringing billions of dollars to Maine, helping the state continue to push through this crisis and bounce back stronger than ever.

After passing the *American Rescue Plan*, Congress turned its attention to a longstanding but unfulfilled priority: infrastructure. Through hard work and compromise, both parties came together to pass a bipartisan bill that finally addresses key infrastructure needs. For Maine people, the bill means an estimated \$1.5 billion to repair crumbling roads and out-of-date bridges, \$390 million to improve access to clean drinking water, and more. I am most excited about the significant funding for broadband – because, as we have seen during the pandemic, broadband is a necessity to succeed in the 21st century economy. The historic investments in the bipartisan infrastructure bill, combined with additional funding I pushed for in *the American Rescue Plan*, will bring an estimated \$400 million for broadband home to Maine. These funds will be nothing short of transformational, creating new opportunities across our state.

These two bills have made and will continue to make a real difference for Maine people, helping to both address the challenges of COVID-19 and lay a foundation for long-term success. I am proud of what we've

accomplished this year – but I know there is still a lot of work to do and that the road ahead is challenging. Even still, I am filled with optimism because I know the true nature of our citizens, though challenged, has not changed. Despite every hardship, people in towns and communities have stepped up with strong local leadership, a willingness to help, and a Maine 'neighborhood' spirit. It is why I truly believe we can and will get through anything together. Mary and I wish you a happy, healthy, and safe 2022.

Dear Friends:

I am deeply honored to serve the people of Maine in the U.S. Senate, and I welcome this opportunity to share some of the areas I have been working on over the past year.

The ongoing COVID-19 pandemic continues to pose enormous challenges for our state and our country. When the pandemic began, I co-authored the Paycheck Protection Program that helped small businesses remain afloat and keep their employees paid. In Maine, our small businesses received more than 47,000 forgivable loans totaling \$3.2 billion. I also led efforts to provide relief for loggers, lobstermen, and bus companies.

In addition, I helped secure \$700 million to assist Maine's overwhelmed hospitals and nursing homes, and a new law I led prevented Medicare payment cuts to help further ease the financial strain on our hospitals. I also urged the CDC to update its recommendations so that our students and teachers could safely return to their classrooms, and I pressed the Administration to end the closure of the U.S.-Canada border.

While addressing the pandemic has been a major focus, I've also worked hard to ensure Maine's other needs are met. A group of 10 Senators, of which I was a part, negotiated the landmark bipartisan infrastructure bill that was signed into law in November. I co-authored the section of the bill that will provide Maine with as much as \$300 million to expand high-speed internet in rural and underserved areas.

Soaring inflation is another crisis, particularly when it comes to the cost of heating oil. I have strongly supported federal programs that help Maine families stay warm. In November, Maine was awarded \$35 million to help low-income Mainers pay their energy bills. And the bipartisan infrastructure bill included \$3.5 billion to help families make energy efficiency improvements that would permanently lower their heating costs.

As a senior member of the Appropriations Committee, I have supported investments in Maine's communities. This year's funding bills include \$265 million I championed for 106 projects across Maine. These projects would help create jobs, improve workforce training, address the opioid crisis, and increase access to childcare and health care services. In addition, I worked to reverse proposed cuts to our Navy in order to help protect America and keep the skilled workers at Bath Iron Works on the job. The bills also include \$475 million for the construction of a new dry dock at Maine's Portsmouth Naval Shipyard that will allow the Navy to continue to carry out its submarine missions. I will keep working to get these important bills enacted.

No one works harder than the people of Maine, and this year I honored that work ethic when I cast my 8,000th consecutive vote, becoming the only Senator in history to do so without ever having missed a roll call vote. The Lugar Center at Georgetown University once again ranked me as the most bipartisan Senator for the eighth year in a row.

In the New Year, I will keep working to solve problems and make life better for the people of Maine and America. May 2022 be a happy, healthy, and successful one for you, your family, and our state.
