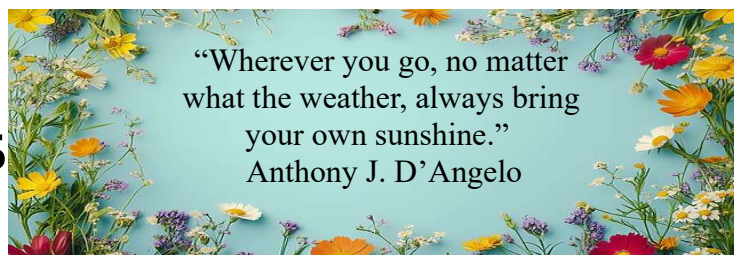

Planning to Build a New Accessory Structure?

New Rules Apply!

Accessory Structures are allowed in most zones without a permit but must meet the Land Use Planning Commission's (LUPC) rules, which were updated recently.

What's new? Property owners must now submit a self-verification notice to the LUPC before construction. The notice process will tell the Commission a little about your project, verify that it meets the rules, and let you know if a permit is needed.

Accessory Structures

What are they?

The term "Accessory Structures" can include garages, decks, porches, stand-alone solar installations, sheds, and other similar structures.

Provide a Notice to LUPC

There is an online form to make it easier for property owners to notify the LUPC. You can also request a paper copy of the notice form.

- What you are building,
- Where it is located, and
- That your new structure will meet the rules.

How can I store my medicine safely?

- Store all prescription and over-the-counter medicines in a cool, dry, and secure place.
- Keep all medicine, including vitamins, herbs, and supplements, up and away, out of reach of children and pets.
- Keep all medicine in their original containers with labels intact.

Remember, medication should only be used by the person for whom it was prescribed, and in the manner and dosage prescribed.

How can I safely dispose of medicine that has expired or is no longer needed?

Prescription Drug Disposal Drop boxes are the best way to safely dispose of medications that have expired or are no longer needed.

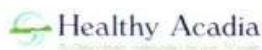
Safe disposal:

- Helps to improve the health of our communities;
- Reduces the potential for drug misuse and youth access;
- Helps to protect our water supply and our environment.



Dispose of expired or unused medication in a safe manner, such as a designated drop box, mailback site, or a drug take-back event.

SECONDHAND SMOKE

is the tobacco smoke exhaled by a person smoking
or from a burning tobacco product.



Secondhand smoke contains thousands of **chemicals**, at least 69 are known to cause **cancer**.



There is no safe level of **exposure** to secondhand smoke.



Brief exposure to secondhand smoke causes **health damage** that is known to cause illness and **cancer**.



Using ventilation systems, or opening a window, does not eliminate the **harmful effects** of secondhand smoke.



Children exposed to secondhand smoke are at higher risk for **health issues**.



Pets that breathe secondhand smoke are more likely to develop **cancer**.

THIRDHAND SMOKE

is the tobacco smoke residue that remains
after a tobacco product has been put out.



After smoke clears, **toxins linger**, which may leave an odor.



Thirdhand smoke **contains chemicals** known to cause **cancer**.



Smoke **residue sticks** to clothing, hair, and skin.



Lingering toxins resist normal household cleaning.



Thirdhand smoke **builds up** over time on carpets, walls, furniture, plastic toys, and stuffed animals.



Infants and children are **more exposed** to thirdhand smoke because they crawl on the floor and put things in their mouths.

IF YOU SMOKE: Protect your family, friends, and coworkers, wash your hands and hair, and change your clothes before coming in contact with others, especially infants and children.
